


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If you look at the Contents pages, you will find sixteen major areas which form the basis of English grammar. So you can try and memorize their formats to use in your own communication. For instance, you may encounter example questions such as, "Can you tell me the way to the school?" You can memorize the first half of the sentence and replace "school" with "bank" or "restaurant" as the case may be, and use it anytime you need to ask for directions. Look for answer keys to check your answers. When you're selecting a grammar book, make sure that you check for an attached answer key to any exercises in the book.
